



Snowshoeing Trail Report

In the non-winter season the Snowshoe Trails turn in to Hiking Trails and are open year around. Enjoy!

Be sure to check out the new East Side Snowshoe Trails. To get to the new trails start on the Blue Trail by the base of the Hurricane Triple chair lift. Follow the trail a short distance and you will see signs on the left for the new East Side Trails. A Green Trail will take you across Craney Pond Rd. and on to Goodwin Rd. (by the red house). This is a public road, but not marked. Please don't go down the private driveway. Follow Goodwin Rd. about ¼ mile. You will see a fine stone foundation on the left with a historical plaque denoting "The Site of the First Rope Walk in Henniker". Just after this on the right the New East Side Snowshoe Trail enters the woods.

The trail starts as Green (Easy), turns to Blue (Moderate) and then Black (Difficult). A future Green trail will take you back to Craney Pond Rd and the old Blue Trail, but is not yet completed. The Blue Trail continues straight and eventually takes a right (the Black Trail continues straight) and crosses Craney Pond Rd. and reconnects to the original Blue Trail. From there you can go left on the Blue Trail to the Cascade Basin or right and return to the lodge. After the Blue Trail turns right, the Black trail continues straight and takes you back across Craney Pond Rd and to the old Blue Trail that you started on. From there you can again go left on the Blue Trail to the Cascade Basin or right and return to the lodge.

Please note that these new trails are not yet on the trail maps.

There is no fee for using the Snowshoe Trails at Pats Peak.
